The five states reporting earliest this year are maintaining approximately the same weighted average rates of gain as have been achieved by the fifty states during the past four years.

This is all the more remarkable because these early-reporting states are by no means the most populous or affluent ones. Two of them, in fact, have practically "stationary" population; and only one of them is above the average of the fifty states in population. There is reason to suppose that, as the larger industrialized and urbanized states report, the rate of increase in appropriations of state tax funds for operating expenses of higher education will be continued or increased.

The total for fiscal year 1968-69 seems to be a gain of about 13 per cent over the comparable figure now reported for fiscal year 1966-67; but that figure is nearly \$1 million larger than originally reported in 1966. On the basis of the 1966 figure as originally reported, the 2-year gain would be 20 per cent. At any rate, the 8-year gain since 1960 appears to be 111 per cent.
