Therefore the average two-year gain of 37 per cent at this point can not be taken as necessarily an accurate predictor. It is possible that it may go up or down considerably.

The total for fiscal year 1969-70 seems to be a gain of 51 per cent over the comparable figure for fiscal year 1967-68, two years earlier. The tenyear gain since fiscal year 1959-60 is 239½ per cent.

The total for fiscal year 1969-70 appears to be a gain of 57½ per cent over the comparable figure for fiscal year 1967-68, two years earlier.

The ten-year gain since fiscal year 1959-60 is 546% per cent.

The 1969 legislature created a new Board of Regents for Education, to be composed of nine lay citizens to be appointed by the governor for overlapping terms of four years, from a list to be established and maintained by an elaborately structured Nominating Committee.

The new Board of Regents is to be a public corporation succeeding to all the powers of the State Board of Education, the state department of education, and the Board of Trustees of State Colleges. The act does not, however, explicitly abolish these agencies, but apparently gives the Regents leeway to continue or reconstitute them or to redefine their duties if and when it may so determine; or to reassign their duties to other boards or agencies created by it.

A first reading of the act suggests that there may be a justiciable question involved as to unconstitutional delegation of legislative power. Meantime, the act is effective July 1, 1969, and many months of uncertainties and adjustments will undoubtedly follow.

The total for biennium 1969-71 appears to be a gain of 39½ per cent over the comparable sum for the preceding biennium 1967-69.

The ten-year gain since 1960 is 307 per cent.

Note that the state's contribution to the two-year community colleges is 26½ per cent of the total of state tax-fund appropriations for operating expenses of all higher education.
