The nine states most recently reported have, when combined with the twenty-five states previously reported, raised the average two-year rate of gain to 37 1/2 per cent, three points above the 34 1/2 per cent where it stood for the twenty-five states first reported. Fifty-state results continue to be hazardous to predict, because none of the eight largest states is reported.

IOWA. The legislature of 1969 authorized the Board of Regents to issue "revenue bonds" to finance academic buildings and use tuition fees to amortize the debt, with the understanding that the legislature will later appropriate funds to replace the fees so used. The 1970 special session appropriated \$145,000 for that purpose. No bonds have been sold, however, pending a court decision on the validity of the act.

Another measure directs the Board of Regents to notify the legislature by April 1, 1971 of the intended tuition and fee schedule for biennium 1971-73. This is an attempt to forestall any raising of fees after the biennial appropriations for 1971-73 are made.

The legislature appropriates a large lump-sum for "general support", (to be allocated among the teaching institutions by the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning), and a number of other direct appropriations to various agencies of research and service, including the medical school and the schools of nursing. Most of these are appendages of the respective teaching institutions.

A combined tabulation of appropriated funds and allocated funds provides totals for the institutions, comparable with those of similar institutions in other states.
