Michigan receives an unusual amount of space in this issue, to afford a little more detailed sketch of one of the largest and best state systems of public education.

The legislature has departed from the long-established custom of lump-sum appropriations to constitutionally autonomous universities and colleges; but the situation is saved, in part, by the substantial sums appropriated for "General support," "Instructional support," and "Other instruction," which give the governing boards wide elbow-room.
