The ten states reported in Table 7 are comparatively small in population, with the exception of Virginia (4,648,494 in 1970), Kentucky (3,219,311), and Missisippi (2,216,912). Utah and New Mexico slightly exceeded the 1 million mark in 1970; the other five are well below that figure. Growth of population in Wyoming has been hardly more than perceptible, and the people of the two Dakotas are slightly fewer than they were in 1960.

Considering these facts, it seems remarkable that these 10 states show a weighted average gain of 27 1/2 per cent for fiscal year 1973-74 over 1971-72, two years earlier. This is well above the weighted average two-year gain for all fifty states shown in 1972-73, which was 22 3/4 per cent. It would be rash to predict what fifty states will do in 1973-74 on the basis of these 10; but among the remaining 40 states are many having swifter population gains and larger increases in average personal incomes that these ten, which would justify substantially greater rates of gain in state tax support of operating expenses of higher education.

In 1972 the Regents of Education adopted a detailed and drastic scheme of reorganization and retyping of the seven institutions, including expecially Draconian cutbacks and consolidations in graduate programs. To what extent the scheme will be ultimately implemented is not known.

A Ceiling on Fees

It is reported that the Vermont legislature, in a favorable mood toward tax-supported low-tuition higher education, appropriated half a million dollars more than the governor had recommended. This, though rare, is not unprecedented, and has happened occasionally in other states.

A clause was added to the appropriations act expressly forbidding the raising of tuition fees for in-state students at the University of Vermont above the present level of \$950 a year;

and forbidding any escalation of in-state fees at the four state colleges above the present level of \$720. The appropriation to the state colleges was \$194,000 more than the governor's recommendation.

A "Non-Campus" Junior College

Some explanation of the unusual "Community College of Vermont" is in order. It is described as "student-centered, non-campus, non-traditional college, established two years ago under an Office of Economic Opportunity grant to provide post-secondary education for those who had not been able to obtain it through existing institutions."

It is said that it "depends heavily upon local resources and utilizes persons competent in their fields but not necessarily trained as teachers." It has received approval by the Vermont State Colleges and has been granted the right to confer associate degrees.

For fiscal year 1973-74 it asked, with the concurrence of the state colleges, for a "token" state appropriation, and was given an appropriation of \$50,000, as noted in Table 14. The argument was made that this public endorsement of its legitimacy would enhance its success in raising funds from other sources.

"Blue Ribbon" Again?

Vermont has no statewide governing board for higher education, nor any "coordinating board" of statewide jurisdiction. Consequently there is a strong faction demanding tighter centralization of planning and governance. Last year a bill to establish an "umbrella" governing board was passed in the House but heavily defeated in the Senate. The 1973 legislature tabled a somewhat similar bill, deferring to the governor's intention of appointing a "blueribbon" committee to study the matter. Is the livestock-show nomenclature becoming a permanent part of language and politics?

RHODE ISLAND. Additional information recently received indicates that the original tabulation for fiscal year 1972-73 includes considerable sums properly attributable to debt service on bonds to finance buildings, and therefore not within the definition of operating expenses.

Because GRAPEVINE's emphasis is largely on prompt and timely reporting, rectifications of this type are occasionally necessary. Our figures are not final or official; but only rarely do they deviate more than slightly from later reports as in this present instance.

The revised tabulation here results in a reduction of Rhode Island's two-year gain to 12 1/2 per cent, and lowers its ranking among the fifty states in "per citizen" appropriations for higher education to 36th, at \$37.72. These changes are substantial in Rhode Island, but they generate only very small discrepancies in the fifty-state summary table circulated annually, usually in October. (GRAPEVINE, page 1092).
