In Table 82 and 83 (above) a total of twenty-one states have reported their appropriations for fiscal year 1974-75. The thirteen states in Table 82 made their appropriations in 1973, a year or more ago, and thus come out of a "bygone era."

The eight states named in Table 83 made their appropriations early in 1974, and thus belong to "a new generation." Their weighted average two-year gain of 28 per cent, when compared with the 18 per cent recorded in Table 82 and with the nationwide average of 25 per cent reported in 1973, afford some possible indication that the legislatures of 1974 may be increasing the rate of gain.

MISSOURI. After some three or four years effort, the "Omnibus State Reorganization Act of 1974" has been passed by the Missouri legislature and signed by the governor. It makes some more or less nominal changes in the statewide structure for higher education. The importance of the changes could be easily overestimated.

It is well to note first that the historic Board of Curators of the University of Missouri, and the separate governing boards of each of the other four-year state universities and colleges, continue in control of their respective institutions. They are transferred into a vague entity called "the department of higher education" "with only such supervision by the head of the department for budgeting and reporting as provided in this act or later acts;" and "such supervision shall not extend to substantive matters relating to policies, regulative functions or appeals from decisions" of the boards being transferred. The method of appointment of members of the boards remains unchanged.

It is expressly provided that "all funds shall be appropriated by the General Assembly to the governing board of each public four-year institution of higher education;" and that each such governing board shall prepare its own expenditure budget for its own institution.

The Missouri Commission on Higher Education, a soft-approach coordinating body which has functioned with considerable success for some ten years, is abolished lock, stock, and barrel, with all its records and responsibilities transferred to a newly established "Coordinating Board for Higher Education." Creation of this board was mandated in an amendment to the state constitution adopted by the electorate August 8, 1972. The new board is to consist of nine members appointed by the governor and senate. The board is to appoint an executive employee to be known as Commissioner of Higher Education.
