The two-year rate of gain reported for Texas (63 per cent) is not a misprint. There are many good reasons for this commendable advance. Texas has a population of approximately 12 million, recently growing at a rapid rate; large resources of oil and gas as well as in agriculture; a hefty surplus in the state treasury. Many important components have been added to the statewide higher educational system, pursuant to authorizations made two and three years ago, and much of the new money is necessary to support the new institutions in their start-up stages. This picture may be a harbinger of what will happen in other vigorous states when the hysteria of economic fright recently afflicting the nation is overcome.

There are a few bright spots in the New Hampshire picture: (1) the apparent rate of two-year gain is well up to the prevailing average of all the states; and (2) hitherto New Hampshire's total appropriations for operating expenses of higher education have been smaller than those of the sister state of Vermont, which is substantially smaller in total population. This year Vermont fell down to barely \$20 million, and is surpasse by New Hampshire's \$22½ million.

New Jersey's piddling two-year rate of gain is nearest to a disastrous showing of any of the 43 states reported thus far. A large factor is the long-continued and obdurate refusal of the legislature (chiefly on account of reactionary leadership in the state senate), to enact a state personal income tax, as urgently advocated by the present Governor Brendan T. Byrne and two of his predecessors, as well as by the state Chamber of Commerce and other organizations.
