Note: In the middle of July the legislature began work on a supplementary appropriations bill which may include at least \$10,000,000 and possibly as much as \$20,000,000 for higher education. NEW JERSEY. A major event of 1976 is the enactment of a state income tax by the legislature in early July. Urgently advocated and pleaded for by Democratic and Republican governors for more than a dozen years, any income tax was stoutly, not to say stubbornly, resisted by a majority of the senate.

Some months ago the state supreme court had ordered all public elementary and secondary schools be shut down as of June 30, 1976, unless the legislature adopted a constitutional method of financing them, in accord with the court's decision which held that reliance on local property taxes created unconstitutional inequalities.

A tumultuous legislature allowed the shut-down to take place, and to continue for a little more than a week until, apparently recognizing that no more than a futile exercise of postponing the inevitable was going on, both houses passed the bill. It was immediately signed by Governor Brendan T. Byrne, who was standing by for that purpose.

New Jersey's State Income Tax

The statute provides a tax of 2 per cent on adjusted incomes of less than \$20,000 a year, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent on incomes of \$20,000 or more. This is a feeble gesture toward graduated rates; but now that the ancient dam is breached, it may be confidently expected that the act will be improved in future sessions.

As it is, the tax is expected to produce about \$775 million a year. Some \$374 million will be used to improve the elementary and secondary schools, and the remainder will go to the local governmental units to effect a reduction of local property taxes. Elderly homeowners will be favored somewhat, and tenants of rented homes will also receive some benefits.

Although the act apparently has no direct or immediate impact on the financing of higher education, it will assuredly introduce some improvement in the statewide revenue picture which undergirds all state services, including higher education.
