\*\*\* Delaware and New York are omitted from this cumulative tabulation because their apparent two-year gains were respectively only 5 per cent and 3 per cent-far below the central tendency and unrepresentative of the nationwide territory and population. They will be included in the 50-state summary table usually circulated in October. Meantime, they and any other states reporting single-digit percentages of gain are pinpointed as areas of untypically low rates of gain, to avoid a casual distortion of the nationwide scene.

Thus far, the present year exhibits much less deviation from the mean than has generally characterized recent previous years. Of the entire 41 states reported by August 1, no fewer than 35 show apparent two-year gains within the range of 13 per cent to 33 per cent, inclusive. Only two states are above this range, and only four are below it. As many as 26 states are within the closer range of 19 per cent to 29 per cent, inclusive. Within this latter group, a cluster of thirteen show gains between 22 per cent and 26 per cent inclusive. The median percentage of gain for all 41 states appears to be 22 per cent. This is a premature and incomplete summary.
