The total for fiscal year 1978-79 appears to be a gain of 33 per cent over the comparable figure two years earlier.

### CUMULATED TWO-YEAR GAINS FOR THIRTY ONE STATES SLIGHTLY ABOVE LAST YEAR

At this stage (as of July 1, 1978) the aggregate statewide total appropriations of net state tax funds for annual operating expenses of all higher education for fiscal year 1978-79, as reported to GRAPEVINE by 31 states, are 8½ billion.

When this figure is compared with the comparable figure for the same states two years earlier (for fiscal year 1976-77) the cumulative percentage of gain appears to be 21. This is slightly better than the 20 per cent which was the rate of two-year gain for all fifty states as reported for fiscal year 1977-78 over 1975-76.

The total for all fifty states for 1978-79 will not be known until September at the earliest, because the legislatures have not yet made their appropriations in a dozen or more important states.

An indication that modest rates of growth may continue is afforded by New York's recent appropriation of about 1½ billion (a two-year gain of approximately 14 per cent, as against 3 per cent a year earlier).
