With 39 states reported, as of July 20, 1978, the cumulative total of state tax funds appropriated for operating expenses of higher education stood at \$10½ billion. The weighted average percentage of gain over the comparable figure of two years earlier held up at 20 per cent, continuing somewhat in advance of the rate of general inflation over the same period.

The 11 states presently unreported include some of the most populous, such as California, Illinois and others.

The total for fiscal year 1978-79 appears to be a gain of 17 per cent over the comparable figure two years earlier.

Our Montana correspondent informs us that collective bargaining for the faculty members of the Montana public institutions of higher education is progressing. Four of the six campuses of the University of Montana now have collective bargaining in operation.

Early in 1978 the faculty of the University at Missoula chose the University Teachers' Union/American Federation of Teachers, rejecting two other options: the American Association of University Professors, and "no agent."

The faculty of Eastern Montana College selected the AAUP, and decertified its former agent—a joint agency of the AAUP and the American Federation of Teachers.

PENNSYLVANIA. At the request of Governor Shapp, an Opinion of the Attorney-General of Pennsylvania was issued May 31, 1978, pointing out that under the state constitution (Article III, paragraph 11) the legislature can not add substantive "riders" to a general appropriation act.

The Opinion went on to designate selected wordings in several parts of the general appropriation bill then pending as violative of this principle, and advised that the designated words could be regarded as a nullity and void.

Among the language thus pronounced invalid were some 20 lines of "riders" attached to the part of the bill relating to community colleges; some 94 lines of "riders" relating to reports by the 14 "State Colleges and University"; and two lines declaring that "No funds herein appropriated shall be used in any way relating to the State Colleges and University Distinguished Faculty Awards."

This Opinion apparently influenced the final shaping of the general appropriation act. At present we have no word as to whether the Opinion will be tested in the courts.

Private Institutions

Pennsylvania has an Institutional Assistance Grants program for private institutions of higher education. Neither the "state-owned," nor "state-related," nor the community colleges have ever been eligible under it; but the "private state-aided" institutions were eligible until a new act of 1978 declared that no institution receiving a direct appropriation is eligible to participate in the Institutional Assistance Grants.

Eventually, however, the "private, state-aided" universities and colleges lost no income as a result of this provision, because in the legislative jockeying they were either given equivalent sums added to their direct appropriations, or on a separate line for student aids. Also the basic sum for Institutional Assistance Grants was increased by 5 per cent, meaning some gain for the private colleges eligible under the program.
