At this time of year (early September), with forty-five states having reported appropriations of nearly \$16 billion, with the rate of two-year gain standing at 22 per cent, it is possible to guess that the 50-state total for fiscal 1981 will be somewhat above \$21 billion.

The five states as yet unreported include four of the top ten most populous: California, Michigan, Florida, and Massachusetts. The fifth state is much smaller--Delaware. For fiscal 1980 these five states appropriated more than four and one-half billion.

With expected reasonable gains for 1981 over 1980 (perhaps 10 percent or more for the period of one year) the five unreported states may aggregate \$5 billion. Forty-five states have already reported such gains—a precedent on which this guess is based. GRAPEVINE hopes to finish the 50-state story soon.
