The paragraph states that the public higher education system is capped by Penn State University with 20 or more branch campuses. Please be advised that Penn State University has a private charter, the same as Temple University, University of Pittsburgh and Lincoln University. Public education in Pennsylvania consists of the community colleges and the state owned colleges.

Further in the paragraph there is reference to a "compliment of about 35 local public state-aided community colleges." Pennsylvania has only 14 community colleges.

In that I enjoy reading the newsletter which has served me well these many years, I hope that corrections as described can be made.
