As of September 1, 1981, four out of five of the fifty states had maintained the nationwide level of two-year gains equal to what it had been a year earlier. Eleven states showed two-year gains of from 30 to 60 per cent. Montana, North Dakota and Wyoming formed a bloc. Arizona, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas were a contiguous group in the southwest. Added were Delaware, Georgia, and New Hampshire.

Twelve of the least fortunate among the forty-one reported had two-year gains of 13 per cent or less: Idaho, Oregon and Washington in the Pacific northwest; South Dakota, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, and Illinois in the country's midriff; and Michigan, Tennessee, South Carolina, and Pennsylvania.

Yet to be made final are reports from nine states, including populous California, Ohio, Florida and Massachusetts, as well as Wisconsin and Minnesota.

At the present stage, it is notable that in general all New England and New York and New Jersey show improvements over recent earlier years during which these states were slumping. The big bright spot is the five states in the southwest named above, headed by Texas with a two-year gain of 45 per cent.

WEST VIRGINIA. CORRECTION to Table 46, page 1750, GRAPEVINE (July 1981); James J. Schneider, Director of Finance, Board of Regents, tells us the \$7.4 million deducted from the state-wide total should be restored. Formerly student fees were collected by the institutions and were sent to the state treasury and commingled with state general funds. The 1981 legislature enacted a law returning control of these fees to the institutions for 1982 and future years. This brings the total of state tax support up to \$192,092,000. The rate of two-year gain is 21%. These changes have been made in Table 66, page 1764, this issue.
