FORTY STATES MAKE MODERATE GAINS

By July 31, 1982, GRAPEVINE had received from forty states reports of their annual appropriations of state tax funds for operation of higher education for fiscal year 1983. The weighted average percentage of gain over the immediate preceding two years at that point was 19 per cent; only a point or two less than the similar figures recorded for all fifty states in each of half a dozen earlier years. This does not indicate that the state legislatures are hastily abandoning their support of higher education, even in the face of the extraordinary confusion, controversy, and uncertainty that have beclouded the future of federal-state relations over some two years.

The Swift and the Slow (See the table at the top of page 1831)

Of these 40 states, nine made two-year advances of 28 per cent or more; eight 33% or more; and four 42% or more. The nine are all west of the Mississippi River. At the other end of the scale, another eight of these 40 states moved forward only 7 per cent or less. These eight are widely scattered from coast to coast. The twenty-three states in the major middle segment range from gains of 9 per cent to 24 per cent with the median at 18 per cent.

Predictive Value Is Limited

Although forty states (reported up to mid-1982) as a whole had maintained substantial rates of two-year gain for fiscal 1983, this would not necessarily justify a forecast that the story for fiscal 1983 will continue much the same. The ten states yet unreported are all among the more populous (California, Florida, Illinois, Lousiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, and Wisconsin). Collectively, the ten, in fiscal year 1982, supported higher education with more than half (\$7.4 billion) the volume of dollars appropriated by the other forty states combined (\$13.4 billion). Hence, we have only about two-thirds of the nationwide picture before us. It would be premature to predict what the legislatures of the remaining states will do. But it can be said that up to this point the tale of appropriations for state support of higher education is more cheerful than some had hoped.
