The three states yet unreported are also large: New York, Florida, and Michigan. Barring any large unforeseen changes, they may bring the 50-state aggregate for fiscal 1983 to the vicinity of \$24 billion.

It is notable that Illinois (page 1837) is the fourth state to join the "billion dollar club," though it has made only modest gains in very recent years.

# FORTY-SEVEN STATES: \$20½ BILLION

The seven states most recently reported prior to August 31, 1982, were mainly large states. Three of them show two-year gains (1981-83) of eight per cent or less: California, 4 per cent; Illinois, 4; and Wisconsin, 8.

This brings the weighted average two-year gain for the 47 states down to 15 per cent, from the 19 per cent previously reported for the earlier forty states.
