California Community College System gets an additional \$96.5 million of appropriated state tax support for 1984. Though the governor and the legislature acted adversely earlier this year, the 106 California community colleges recently became the beneficiaries of an additional appropriation of \$96.5 million for fiscal 1984.

This raises the statewide total for all higher education to \$3½ billion for 1984. State and national media of communication are now reporting optimistically about the prospects for 1985 regarding all higher education in California.

FLASHES OF 1985

For 1984 forty-two states reported their <u>annual</u> appropriations. Eight other states reported biennial appropriations for fiscal years 1984 and 1985. As the figures for fiscal 1985 for these eight states now stand, they show weighted average gains of fourteen percent over the two-year period 1983-1985, as compared with eleven percent gains for the fifty states for the two-year period 1982-1984. In other words, the eight states of 1985 show an increase of four percent over the fifty states of 1984. The trend is now upward.

This issue presents reports from four states which were delayed beyond the turn of the year. Two (Indiana and Minnesota) are for the second half of the biennium 1983-1985, and two (Massachusetts and California) are revisions and supplements to earlier preliminary reports. Thus it completes the list of fifty states for 1983 and brings the record up to date. 1984 being an even-numbers year, presumably the forty-two other states will have regular legislative sessions during the first half of the calendar years, and the legislative record of 1984 should be largely complete by the middle of the year. Only after that time will it be possible to say whether 1985 will turn out to produce greater or lesser rates of gains in the appropriations by fifty states than did its predecessor, 1984.

There is a possibility that when the story for 1985 is completed, it will indicate a healthy growth of state tax support of higher education in the fifty states in excess of what occurred during the immediately preceding two years. It is indeed possible that the self-fulfilling prophecy of decline either in enrollment or state support may not materialize during 1984 or during this decade.

INDIANA. In special session in December 1982, the Indiana General Assembly enacted a plan whereby 1/12 of the 1982-83 appropriation for operating expenses of higher education was withheld. Subsequently that amount was re-appropriated for fiscal year 1983-84. The net effect of this action was to "rollover" one month's funds from fiscal 1983 to fiscal 1984. This rollover process was continued when the funds for 1983-84 were appropriated. The figures for fiscal year 1983-84, reported in GRAPEVINE, Table 68, page 1891 (July 1983) represent the rollover from 1982-83 plus 11/12 of the new amount "budgeted" for 1983-84. The rollover process has made calculating the two year gain for fiscal 1985 over fiscal 1983 difficult. In an effort to use comparable figures, the original 1982-83 appropriation (hence ignoring the rollover) was used in determining the 16% gain over two years, reported in this issue on page 1938.

MASSACHUSETTS. Table 27 below updates and supplements prior reports. When the 50state summary for fiscal 1981-82 went to press, GRAPEVINE used an estimate for Massachusetts because the actual appropriations were not available, and on page 1920 of GRAPEVINE (December 1983), revisions of statewide totals for three fiscal years (1982, 1983, 1984) were published with a note indicating the complete tabulations would be published in a future issue. It is not the custom of GRAPEVINE to publish tabulations of former years, but in this case it seemed appropriate in an effort to provide comparable figures for calculating the rates of gain over two year periods.

IOWA. Notice has been received that the total appropriation for annual operating expenses of higher education in Iowa for fiscal year 1984, which was circulated in GRAPEVINE (September 1983) was subsequently ordered reduced by the state executive authorities by 2.8 per cent across the board.

This reduces the "bottom line" for 1984 to \$360,738,000 from \$372,128,000. This means only small inconsequential reduction in the nationwide state of gain for 1984.
