MODERATE BUT USEFUL GAINS

With forty states having reported their appropriations for fiscal 1985, it appears to be possible that the 50-state aggregate may show a two-year gain of approximately 15 per cent over 1983. This rate of gain is certainly not astronomic, nor is it sufficient for the times; but it is a percentage of gain, not of loss, and does not justify despair. Especially is this true because the rate of general inflation is currently declining somewhat.

Among the ten states yet unreported in GRAPEVINE are at least five of very large population: California, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Illinois and Massachusetts. California's customary appropriation of more than \$3 billion per year will push the 50-state total for 1985 toward what we project as a figure of over \$27 billion.
