STATE HIGHER EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS, FISCAL YEAR 1992-93

The next issue of <u>Grapevine</u> will include the annual retrospective for FY1993. An abbreviated version of the state tabulations were reported in <u>The Chronicle of Higher Education</u>, October 21st issue. The following outlines the predominant features of the state funding picture, nationwide. The summary table on the adjacent page illustrates the first four of these characteristics.

Predominant Features

- * The total amount appropriated by state governments to higher education was less than \$40 billion, nationally.
- * This amount, \$40 billion, was less than the amounts appropriated to higher education by state governments in both FY1992 and FY1991, effectively returning appropriation amounts to the FY1990 level.
- * In one-year percentages of gain, there was a negative percent for FY1993 over FY1992, .8%
- * In two-year percentages of gain, there was a .6 percent for FY1993 over FY1991. This is the first time that the national two-year gain dropped below 2% since <u>Grapevine</u> began publication in 1958.
- Nineteen states (38% of the 50 states) reported negative percentages of two-year "gain," FY1993 over FY1991; and seventeen states (34% of the 50) reported negative percentages of one-year "gain," FY1993 over FY1992. Ten of these states had both negative one-year and two-year percentages or actual declines for two consecutive years.
- Dividing the 50 states into quartiles of two-year percentages of gain, all of the states in the bottom quartile were negative and over half of the states in the third quartile were negative.
- * The geographic pattern of two-year percentages of gain for FY1993 was similar to the pattern for FY1992: more states in the Northeast and Southeast quadrants suffered declines than did states in either the Northwest or the Southwest.
